First he fried his scraps of pork in a large kettle until all the fat was tried out, then deposited successive layers of potato, fish, onion and crackers sensation among the members, though it with seasoning in between, until the kettle was full, then added two quarts of milk The chowder was guaranteed a success and was accompanied with "Marshfield punch." Rival Presidents Each Seek to Control Desin es of Republic.

AMERICAN RESIDENTS FLEE FROM WAR

Navy Department Orders Pacific Squadron to Amalapa to Protect Interests of United States Cit. izens in Troubled Country,

PANAMA, Feb. 3.—A cablegram received this morning from Honduras announced that civil war had broken out in that country.
