Ing the conditions for the deposit of Uni-ted States funds with national banks was considered an important influence in the opening strength of the market. The ac-ceptance of other than government bonds by the secretary of the treasury last fail as security for government deposits is be-lieved to have been the saving factor dur-ing the money stringency. The provision allowing the proposed Panama canal con-struction bonds to rank with the 2 per cents as security for deposits, and circulation will afford another important measure of relief from possible money stringency. The coming requirement for the payment of \$40,00,000 to the Panama company shareholders make these means of relief of special importance.
