

FORBES SUSTAINS TITLE

Defends Position as Champion Featherweight Against Tubell

AMERICAN HAS BETTER OF EVERY ROUND

Doesn't Engage When and Where He Will, Outlasting Him in Skill and All else Coverage.

DETROIT, Feb. 27.—Andy Tokell, champion bantam-weight pugilist of England, was beaten tonight by Harry Forbes, the champion bantam-weight of the world.

To say that Forbes was given the decision at the end of ten rounds comes far from telling the measure of his victory. He won the fight from start to finish, had the better of every round, with the possible exception of the seventh, and proved himself the superior in everything, with the exception of courage, and in this he was equal to Tokell.

The latter was something of a disappointment. He showed himself a strong, rugged youngster with a world of power behind his blows and proved himself game to the end. He stood every punishment and came back every time in every round willing and eager to fight.

It still he was outlasted by Forbes, who hit where and when he pleased and as many times as Tokell would take without coming to a clinch or breaking ground. He fought always the way he wanted to, and from the second round to the end there was never a doubt of the result.

Tokell was somewhat cast down by his defeat, but took it philosophically. "I was in good shape," he said, "and did the best I could. That is all I could do."

Forbes after the fight declared that he thought he could have ended the fight before the tenth round had he tried to do so. "It was too important a fight for me to take chances," he said, "so I fought carefully. I think now that if I had lost I might have been out earlier."

The men fought at 115 pounds, at 2 o'clock, both being on the limit.

Fight by Rounds.

Round 1—Forbes led, left reaching clean lightly. Forbes put left to check again. Tokell put straight left on chin, Forbes put right to face. Forbes rubbed right eye. Tokell landed hard right on cheek, staggering Forbes. Forbes put left to neck, receiving hard right to jaw. Forbes put left to jaw, receiving right counter on ribs. Forbes put left and right getting two rights in stomach. Forbes put left to neck, getting counter on ribs. Forbes put three hard lefts to jaw, with one return. Forbes put right to ear, with one return. Forbes put left to jaw, with one return. Tokell showed himself clever and a fast puncher.

Round 2—Forbes put on neck. Tokell blocked left for face and landed jaw. Forbes put left to jaw and clinched. Forbes put right to face, pushing hard counter on ribs. Forbes put left on nose, bringing blood from Tokell's eye with right punch. Forbes put left and right hard. It is not surprising Forbes put three lefts to jaw and Tokell one to the Tokell supported Forbes, who viciously. Tokell missed right swing and right counter in response to straight lefts. Tokell swung wildly left, receiving right left in face. Forbes uppercut on chest, driving Tokell into a clinch. Tokell went to his corner bleeding badly.

Round 4—Forbes put left to chest and then they sparred. Forbes put a vicious left to the jaw, following it with a straight left to Tokell's head. Tokell caught Forbes on the back of the head as he came in. Tokell put left to chest and received a hard right in the stomach. Tokell landed a left chop on the chest and put a right to ribs. Tokell put left to chest, receiving a hard right on the chest. Forbes put left and right on jaw, receiving right on ribs and a light right on the jaw.

Round 5—Forbes put left to chest, getting a left on the neck. Tokell caught straight lefts twice on his forehead and had a hard left on the cheek. Forbes staggered Tokell with a hard one on the jaw. Forbes uppercut Tokell on the stomach and caught him on the left. Tokell caught Forbes with a right swing on the stomach without a return. Forbes landed a straight left on Tokell's head and blocked an uppercut and clinched. Tokell put a hard right on the ribs and clinched, near the end of the round. Tokell missed clearly as the bell rang.
