RIOTERS-ARRAIGNED IN POLICE COURT

Men Accused of Assaulting Strike Breaker Root Plead Not Guilty to Charges Brought Against Them.

The condition of J. W. McCann, the striker who was shot during the altercation which arose between strikers and strike breakers at the corner of Ninth street and Capitol avenue Tuesday was reported considerably improved Wednesday morning.

Assistant County Attorney Magney has not fully decided what charge he will prefer against McCann. All of the strikers who were arrested for having participated in the fight deny their presence in the locality when the fight occurred.

When the police court session opened yesterday standing room was at a premium. The courtroom and corridors being filled with friends of the arrested strikers.

A. B. White, G. A. Thorpe, John Sinclair, Joseph Ranne, E. J. Peterson, William Ribbles and Louis Metz were arraigned before Judge Berka on the charge of assault with intent to inflict great bodily injury.
