GRAND JURY ENDS LABORS

Finds Litt's to Complain in Condition of City and County Jails

BATCH OF INDICTMENTS RETURNED

None of Them, So Far as Made Known, Are of a Nature to Excite Any Particular Public Interest.

The district court grand jury completed its deliberations yesterday afternoon after returning a large batch of indictments and but two "no bills." As usual, several of the indictments were made special yesterday, owing to the fact that the defendants were not under arrest.

In its report on the city and county jails, the grand jury said it found them in good and sanitary condition with the exception that the female ward in the county jail appeared to be insufficiently heated and the toilets needing repairing. The grand jury also inspected St. Bernard's hospital, where the insane patients are confined, and found everything there in first class condition.

Indictments against the following persons were made public yesterday: John Thorsden, charged with breaking into the premises of Mrs. Susan Thome in Garner township on the night of January 6 and stealing eighty-five chickens and a set of harness. Ball fixed at \$500.

John Thorsden, charged with breaking into the premises of Mrs. M. A. Quick in Garner township on the night of February 1 and stealing a number of chickens. Ball placed at \$500.

Otto Kahler, charged with embezzling \$50 alleged to have been entrusted to his care by David McKnight in the Red Light saloon, where he was employed as bartender. Ball fixed at \$500.

John Achats, proprietor of the Red Light saloon at 1021 Broadway, charged with maintaining a nuisance. Ball fixed at \$500.

John S. Heller, charged with robbing Dew Whelan of \$35 on March 3 while the latter was asleep in the railroad yards at Neola. Ball placed at \$500.

Harry Hall, charged with breaking into a freight car in the Northwestern yards on the night of March 27 and stealing forty cases of loaded shells. His ball was placed at \$500.

Frank Woods, charged with breaking into Charles Nicholson's butcher shop at 129 Broadway on the night of March 2 and stealing some pennies and a 25-cent piece with a hole in it. Ball was fixed at \$500.

Soren Albertson, charged with stealing \$10.50 from Carl Christiansen, with whom he roomed at 1223 Broadway, on June 1, 1902. His ball was placed at \$500.

James Burk, charged with the theft of articles of clothing from Minnie Haylor's restaurant on South Main street on March 22. Ball was fixed at \$500.

John Fahy, charged with breaking into a Northwestern freight car in the local yards and stealing a quantity of rubbers and overalls on the night of February 25 last. His ball was placed at \$500.

No bills were returned in the cases of Mrs. Jennie Williams, charged with shooting Albert Hawkins in the kneecap, and Fred Glenn, charged with malicious mischief and assault by driving his broncho onto the front porch of the residence of W. C. Webster and assaulting Mrs. Webster with a whip.

Albert Ingram was indicted, charged with breaking into the premises of Richard Gunnoude on the night of March 14. It is alleged that Ingram is the man who was caught by Gunnoude and a neighbor in Gunnoude's barn with a pocketful of tools, but who made his escape while awaiting the arrival of the police by slipping out of his overcoat. Ingram gave bail in \$500 and insists it is a case of mistaken identity.

Clinton Woodmen Warm. CLINTON, Ia., April 1.—(Special Telegram.)—The Modern Woodmen of America convention held here to select delegates to the state camp to be held in Des Moines to select delegates to the national camp at Indianapolis resulted in some sensational developments. The resolution adopted censured the "extravagant" administration of the present officials and while disapproval was not openly charged, it was implied in the resolutions, which also endorsed the candidacy of J. G. Johnson of Peabody, Kan., as head counselor. The resolutions declare in favor of sealing the policies of new members, but are against readjustment.

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Count of State Cash. The count of the funds and money in the hands of the state treasury for the quarterly period was made today by the governor and the balances were found to be correct. The amount of money to the credit of the state, either in cash or in bonds, was found to be \$1,733,106.97. This is represented by \$647,457 in bonds belonging to the state college, in a permanent fund financing the sale of the swamp lands, and the remainder is in cash in the state treasury or in banks as depositories. The only depositories are Dr. Des Moines. The money belongs to various funds as follows: General revenue fund.....\$655,200.24 Endowment fund.....\$47,400.00 Iowa state college building.....\$2,558.97 State college interest.....\$1,122.35 State normal school.....\$1,536.55 Morrill fund.....\$10,000.00 State normal fund.....\$6,409.13 Endowment fund cash.....\$65,233.41

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Will Not Pay for Inebriates. The matter of payment of the cost of inebriate trials and of sending inebriates to the state hospital came to a crisis in this county today when the Board of Supervisors received notice from the Board of Supervisors to issue any further warrants in payment of these expenses out of the insane fund, as the board will not allow the bills. The law provides for treating inebriates the same as the insane, in the matter of paying expenses, but the board in this instance declines to pay for the inebriates for insane purposes is only sufficient to pay for the keeping of the insane and for no other purposes.

OUTPUT OF PACKING HOUSES. Considerable Improvement Noted in the Marketing of Hogs. CINCINNATI, April 1.—(Special Telegram.)—Price Current says: The movement of hogs increases under some betterment of road conditions. The total western packing was 350,000, compared with 280,000 the preceding week and 385,000 last year. Since March 1 the total is 1,420,000, against 1,700,000 for the same period last year.
