Terminal Company Changes Ita Mind Regarding East Omaba Bridge.

CONDITIONS NOT LIKE UNION PACIFIC

Assessor is Notified, but County Trensurer on Yet Has No Direct Knowledge of the Change of Mind.

City Assessor F. F. Everest has received notice from J. H. Daniels, treasurer of the Omaha Bridge & Terminal company, that on second consideration the company would pay the city taxes assessed on the east half of its bridge across the Missouri river. The notice received by Assessor Everest was purely unofficial and nothing has been said so far to County Treasurer Arnd by Mr. Daniels or any other officer of the Terminal company on the matter.

Treasurer Arnd said yesterday that the ompany had not yet paid the city taxes on the bridge and that all he knew about the matter was that Assessor Everest had told him that Treasurer Daniels had stated the company had reconsidered its decision not He said he was glad that the Ferminal company had reached this detision as it saved lengthy and expensive iitigation. The refusal of the Terminal company to pay the city taxes on the lowa end of the bridge was based on the ruling of Judge McPherson in the Union Pacific bridge case, which ruling was sustained by the United States circuit court of appeals. The conditions surrounding the eastern termini of the two bridges, however, was materially different and the fact that property immediately adjoining the eastern terminus of the Terminal company's bridge paid municipal taxes led the Terminal company to change its mind and consent to pay the city taxes assessed against the bridge.




