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MONOPOLIZED BY FOREIGNERS

New Native Born Americans Engaged in the Craft of Carving Ivory and Meerschaum.

The trade of the carvers in bone, ivory, meerschaum and other materials has never fully recovered from the blow it received in the hard times beginning in 1893.

Many of them were driven out of the trade into other and cruder lines of carving.

Only a few of those who have changed their medium have been able to find work of the old kind.

Only a very small part of those who do such carving belong to the class of true artists in ivory, bone and meerschaum.

Of these highly skilled carvers, the majority are of foreign birth.

Only two skilled Japanese carvers are employed in this city, and no Chinese carvers have come to town.

Most of those engaged in the art are Germans, though a few Frenchmen have worked here.

The German carver of taste and skill could earn much higher pay here than at home.
