The present form of government for Omaha is one of concentrated authority. Only six officers are elected in addition to fire and police departments, centers in the mayor, subject to confirmation by the council. Each policeman and fireman shall receive a sum not exceeding seventy-five (\$75) dollars per month, and not less than sixty-five dollars per month, and not less than sixty-five dollars per month, and each officer of police and fire department or engineer of fire engines, under the rank of chief or assistant chief, shall receive a sum not exceeding ninety (\$96) dollars per month, to be fixed by the Board of Fire and Police Commissioners.

Limits on Appropriations.

In the matter of appropriations the city authorities are similarly tied down. Each department must look for maintenance to s particular fund and the amount of money that can be raised for each fund by taxation is limited not to a percentage on the asseesment roll, but to an absolute sum. The aggregate maximum of the levy for city purposes, exclusive of schools which are administered by separate school board, is \$1,040,000, divided as follows:

The city has other revenues besides the proceeds of taxation, but they are of comparative insignificance because the income from licenses, fines and penalties must, to conform to constitutional mandate, be turned over entirely to the school board for the school fund.

For street improvements an elaborate system of taxation by special assessment has been devised, largely as an outgrowth of past experience, by which abutting property enjoying the benefits is assessed for the cost. These assessments are imposed by ordinance after certain jurisdictional preliminaries are observed and equalized by the council as a board of equalization. The city has guaranty contracts covering most of its newly laid pavements, requiring the contractor to keep it in repair certain number of years, usually five, and it has another separate contract for the repair of asphalt pavements on which the

guaranty has expired. Omaha's Water Supply.

Up to the present Omaha has been supplied with water by a private corporation operating under a contract with the city, fire protection at specified rates. The numwith the water company the city has a unexpired franchise at the end of a twentyfive-year period, which terminates in September next. It has also the right to acquire the plant by eminent domain, in which case the appraisement would have to take into account the unexpired contract. The acquisition of the plant has been constantly agitated and in anticipation of the purchase bonds to the amoun of \$3,000,000 were voted at the last city election. To put this purchase plan into effect a charter amendment has just been enacted creating a water board separate and distinct from the other branches of the city government, consisting of six members three from each of the opposing political parties, appointed originally by the governor for terms, expiring alternate biennials from one political party, by the governor of governor-appointed commissioners are to

The charter establishes the depository plan for city funds. It requires all the increment from public moneys to be turned into the public treasury. Banks of substantial capital may become city deposltories by bidding not less than 2 per cent interest on current balances and filing bonds to safeguard the city against loss. It is needless to say that hone of the banks have ever paid more than the required 2 per cent.

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
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
