Churches of Omaha observe anniversary of Resurrection.

At St. Patrick's church Father Smith, pastor of the parish, celebrated solemn high mass at 10:30 o'clock.

At Sacred Heart Church, Father P. J. Judge was the celebrant of high mass at the Sacred Heart church and preached a sermon appropriate to the day.

At St. Cecilia's church Father Harrington celebrated solemn high mass at 10:30 o'clock.

At Holy Family church Father Fitzpatrick was the celebrant of the solemn high mass and the music was by the regular choir of the church.
