The world had seen resurrections the land of its glory. before, but never before had they seen a perfect life. The resurrection from the dead followed, as a natural consequence. The incorruptible life within Him was stronger than the grasp of death. Jesus rose from the dead because the germ, the seed of life within Him had never been subject to death or weakened by sin. No grave could have held that buoyant, irresistible life. It is impossible for life to be destroyed as long as it is held in obedience to its law.

"In the death of Jesus there is one thing that all should remember-He died because He wished to die. All other men die because they must. Had Jesus not been able to continue living, had He so willed. He would have made no sacrifice by dying."




