HAY OPPOSES RUSSIAN MOVE

Take: Secret S eps to Prevent Ohina Granting anchurian Deman la

UNITED STATES TAKES ACTION ALONE

Great Britain and Japan Expected to Work Along Same Lines, but Washington Officials Steer Clear of Alliances,

WASHINGTON, April 25,-The Japanese minister, Mr. Takahira, and Baron Von Sternburg called on Secretary Hay today and it is believed that the Manchurlan question was discussed. Secretary Hay has no advices from St. Petersburg or London, but it is believed he will shortly hear from the Russian capital.

preliminary to the preparation of a protest which is to be made against the Rusmian demands, but it is not yet clear what form this will take. The protest, however, China, which will be warned that any action that will alienate Chinese territory or confer special advantage on one nation will be deemed unfriendly.

State Department Discouraged.

Officials here who have labored so long to preserve the integrity of China begin to and to believe the best that can be done now is to save as much as possible from the wreck. It therefore appears likely that an effort will be made to procure from Russia a binding promise that the powers will not be entirely deprived of the right to exploit Manchuria commercially.

It may now be possible to secure the opening of one or two ports as proposed in the pending treaty between China and the United States, which will probably have to be amended, in view of these last developments. The fear is expressed that the Russian move will be copied by other nations. and that Germany will proceed to extend its sphere of influence in the Shan Tung peninsula, while France will overlap the borders of Tonquin.

Having heard from the president, Secretary Hay is now in a position to act respecting the Manchurian matter. Indeed he has already taken the first step, although for obvious reasons it is not deemed well to indicate its nature.

It is made quite plain, however, that the United States will join no general protest against Russian action. The State department's policy is so clearly defined in such matters that the officials assume it is understood that whatever action the United States takes will be individual. It is true that it may run parallel to the action of other powers, similarly interested, but there will be no entangling alliance.

Diplomats Await Developments.

In diplomatic circles developments regarding the Chinese situation are anxiously awaited. It is expected by the representatives of the powers that Great Britain and Japan will act in harmony with the United States in the demand upon China not to yield to the Russian demand.

It was pointed out in one quarter that it would make but little difference whether China accepted or rejected the Russian terms for the evacuation of Manchuria since if China refused to agree Russia could continue the occupation of Manchuria. In another diplomatic quarter the opinion was expressed that Russia is asking more than

it really hopes to obtain. The Russian government, it is said in its sphere of influence in China and con tends that it is wholly within its right to impose certain conditions before withdrawing in order to safeguard its interests.

There is no apprehension among the representatives of the powers that Manchurian affairs will lead to anything beyond diplomatte exchanges.

At the embassies of the British, German, Russian and French governments it is said that no official advices concerning Manchuria have been received from the foreign offices of their respective govern-

In the absence of anything official from his government the Russian ambassador in JEWS ARE CRUELLY TREATED a note to Secretary Hay announced that nothing inimical to the United States was Scores Are Shot and Benten projected by Russia.

LONDON, April 25 .- Viscount Hayishi, the Japanese minister here, received today cable from the government at Tokio fully confirming the reports of the Russian demands regarding Manchuria.

The minister expressed the opinion that they were entirely opposed to the policy of the open door, but, he added, that he was not yet in a position to say what action would be taken by the interested

Germany is Forewarned. BERLIN, April 25 .- Russia's latest de-German government, Some indications titute. even exist that the foreign office here was privy to Russia's purposes in advance and expressed indifference to them. This is in exact accord with the policy to resist Russia in nothing in which it is in earnest.

Chancellor Buelow's declarations in the Reichstag two years ago has been that Germany has no interests there, and hence that Germany is simply in a position of find it consistent with this attitude to join with other powers in expressing the hope that trade will have freedom in Manchuria. Russia would not object to Germany's participation in such representation. What Germany will not do is to join in any energetic pressure at Peking to prevent China

from yielding on every point. The expectation here is that all kinds of written protests, from Great Britain and the United States, will be lodged at the Russian foreign office and that these will be replied to with ample courtesy and reasonableness, but that the correspondence will be the only satisfaction the United States and Great Britain will get for their open door demands. ST. PETERSBURG, April 25.-The officials of the Foreign office expressed to the Asso-These conferences and exchanges are all clated Press today intense surprise over the report that American public opinion was disturbed by the news regarding Manchuria. 
