WASHINGTON, April 25.—The Japanese minister, Mr. Takahira, and Baron von Shunburg called on Secretary Hay today and it is believed that the Manchurian question was discussed. Secretary Hay has no advice from St. Petersburg or London, but it is believed he will shortly hear from the Russian capital.

These conferences and exchanges are all preliminary to the preparation of a protest which is to be made against the Russian demands, but it is not yet clear what form this will take. The protest, however, must be directed, not to Russia, but to China, which will be warned that any action that will alienate Chinese territory or confer special advantage on one nation will be deemed unfriendly.
