WIRE WAR FINISH FIGHT

Western Union Will Give Boys Everything Asked Except Union Recognition.

READING MINES RUN FOR NINE HOURS

Workmen Labor Longer Than Ever Before on a Saturday on First Day After Lock-out Ends.

BUTTE, Mont., April 25.—Indications today point to a finish fight between the Western Union and the striking messengers, backed by the unions of the city. The striking messengers have in a measure dropped from view and the struggle now is over the question of recognition of the union.

The telegraph company is willing, it is said, to make concessions regarding wages and hours, but under no circumstances will it recognize or treat with the union. The Trades and Labor assembly having the strike in charge will meet tomorrow and, it is stated, will stand firmly for the recognition of the messenger boys' union by the telegraph company.

Reading Men Work Long.

POTTSVILLE, Pa., April 25.—Thirty-five of the Reading company's forty-three collieries were in operation nine hours today. This is the first time in the history of the anthracite mining industry that the miners have worked nine hours on a Saturday.

At Shenandoah, owing to a misunderstanding, the men did not report for work. Meetings were held, however, and the mine workers decided to return to the collieries on Monday. When they resume their places the entire 30,000 employees who were locked out will have been reinstated.

Philadelphia Faces Building War.

PHILADELPHIA, April 25.—Local unions affiliated with the Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners of America have rejected the compromise offered by the master carpenters relative to the new wage scale to go into effect on May 1. It now seems probable that unless the latter agree to the demands of the brotherhood before next Friday a general strike will be ordered. If a strike shall be ordered nearly 15,000 men will stop work.

The action of the brotherhood has been supported by the Amalgamated Association of Carpenters, which is affiliated with the Council of Allied Building Trades, and the support of the latter is assured.

Helena, Mont., April 25.—The supreme court today decided it had no jurisdiction to restrain the school textbook commissioners entering into a contract requiring that only textbooks bearing the union label be purchased.

BRIDGEPORT, N. J., April 25.—The Cumberland Glass Manufacturing company today announced that beginning next Monday the wages of all unskilled labor will be increased from 10 to 15 per cent. Officials say unskilled workmen have not been paid proportionately with skilled workers.

OMAHA HIGH SCHOOL NOTES.

Miss Bernice Carson entertained Company E very delightfully at her home Friday evening.

The high school sub-basket ball team played against the Deaf and Dumb institute last Wednesday. The game resulted in a score of 2 to 1 in favor of the Deaf and Dumb institute.

A great deal of dissatisfaction was caused among the teachers several weeks ago, when it was learned that the monthly examination would be averaged as one-half the monthly mark. A large number of students objected to this and preferred the system of averaging the heretofore—that is, counting the monthly test as one-third the monthly average. Last month several of the teachers marked according to this new system, in some cases making the student's average less than it would have been otherwise. So to make things right again the old system of marking has been restored.

LOCAL BREVITIES.

City Engineer Rosewater has completely recovered from his recent illness and left yesterday on a short business trip to Kansas City.

Judge Louis Berka will address the Philanthropic society at the Faxon hotel at 2:30 this afternoon. His subject will be "Reformatory."

DISCOVERS SMALLPOX GERM

Harvard Professor Uncovers Bacillus Which Produces Dread Disease.

BOSTON, April 25.—The Globe will announce tomorrow that Dr. William Thomas Councilman, the Shattuck professor of pathological anatomy in the Harvard Medical school, has discovered the germ that causes smallpox.

The discovery is pronounced by physicians who have been made aware of it as one of the really great finds in medical history, and the most important made in Boston, rivaling the discovery of ether as an anesthetic.

The details of the investigation will be furnished to medical men by the discoverer on Tuesday evening. Tuesday's meeting of physicians will be held at the Harvard Medical school under the auspices of the Boston Society of Medical Science and the notices merely state that Dr. Councilman will have an announcement to make upon "The Etiology of Smallpox."

LEE TO RESIGN TOMORROW

Missouri's Lieutenant Governor Expected to Give Up Office Immediately.

ST. LOUIS, Mo., April 25.—An apparently well founded rumor is current that Lieutenant Governor Lee will probably resign on Monday.

It is understood that this decision was reached today at a conference between Mr. Lee and his advisers. When seen at his residence tonight, however, he refused to discuss the matter. He would not deny that he contemplated resigning, but regarded the date as his private affairs. In the event of Mr. Lee's resignation, Thomas Ruby of Macon, president pro tem of the senate, would become acting lieutenant governor.

OLD OMAHA MAN LIES DYING

John Evans, for Many Years City Clerk, Sustains Serious Burns.

NEW YORK, April 25.—John T. Evans, for many years a resident of Omaha, served as city clerk and lately treasurer of the Luna Park Amusement company at Coney Island, is said to be dying at his home as a result of accidental burns.

Montana Jury Foreman Drops Dead in Court After Announcing Colleagues' Findings.

HAMILTON, Mont., April 25.—After returning a verdict in a damage suit, J. McGinty, foreman of the jury, dropped dead in court of heart disease.

HOPE RICHARDS WILL RECOVER

Doctors Report Further Improvement in Wyoming Governor's Condition.

CHEYENNE, April 25.—The condition of Governor Richards was much improved at midnight, and hopes are expressed for his recovery.

Elevator Conductors' Ball.

The Omaha Elevator Conductors' association is busily working out the plans for its May day dance, which it has planned to give on May 1 at Washington hall. C. F. Harkin has been made floor manager and committee has been appointed that promise to make the dance all that might be desired. On Saturday, May 1, the association will meet to consider the matter of reorganization. Labor leaders are desirous that the elevator conductors should form a union, but they are not especially anxious to do so, as they feel well satisfied with the present situation. At the present time the elevator conductors are receiving better wages in Omaha than they are in towns such as Chicago, where the union organizations of their craft exist.

German Methodists' Conference.

The North Nebraska conference and Epworth league convention of the German Methodist Episcopal church will be held at the German Methodist church, corner of Eleventh and Center streets, from April 29 to May 2. A reception will be given Friday evening next in honor of the visitors. The meetings will be each morning and afternoon, under the direction of the presiding elder, Rev. Edward Sollenbach, and Rev. John Kaehler.

Pole Vault Record Smashed.

DES MOINES, April 25.—H. Thurman Chapman of Drake university, in Des Moines, broke the world's pole vault record at the home field meet today, making a vault of 12 feet. The world's record was 11 feet 10 1/2 inches, held by Clapp of Yale, who had since broken it at the Keokuk (Ia.) Young Men's Christian association for two years.
