PHILADELPHIA, April 25 .- Local unions filliated with the Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners of America have rejected the compromise offered by the master carpenters relative to the new wage scale to go into effect on May 1. It now seems probable that unless the latter agree to the demands of the brotherhood before next Friday a general strike will be ordered. If a strike shall be ordered nearly 15,000 men will stop work.

The action of the brotherhood has been supported by the Amalgamated Association of Carpenters, which is affiliated with the Council of Allied Building Trades, and the

support of the latter is assured. The brotherhood's demand is for 50 cents an hour after May 1. The master carpenters offered a compromise at 45 cents an hour after July 1. This has been rejected Efforts will be made by the district council of the Brotherhood of Carpenters to bring about an amicable settlement of the differences.
