The special college levies were fixed by the state legislature and the sums raised are slightly in excess of what was anticipated by the legislature. The amount raised for the general revenue fund for 1902 was nearly \$500,000 more than the amount raised in the previous year.

Important Rate Hearing

The State Board of Railroad commission ers has set May 5 as a date for a special hearing on revision of the freight rates and changes in the classification, and notices have been sent out to the shippers of the state to that effect. The proposed changes affect a number of commodities in each case, the board being asked to lower the classification so as to cheapen the rates. for lubricating purposes; oil barrels, empty, return d; feed, including gluten meal; diamond vise, boxed; glucose refuse, sticky fly paper and oil in barrels. Classifications are proposed for the first time on wire fence stretchers, on manilla wrapping paper and on "Ocean Waves," the latter an amusement apparatus resembling a merry go-round. It is expected a number of ship pers and railroad men will be here and other similar matters will be taken up at the same time. Only a few changes in the lowa classification have been made since

the general revision of a year ago. Adjustment has been made of the com plaint of persons living along the line of the Cedar Rapids branch of the Rock Island system that the company was charging for passengers more than 3 cents a mile on some local business. The company was permitted to do this under the old classification when the Cedar Rapids branch was the Burlington, Cedar Rapids & Northern railroad. The company has revised its rates and is now charging the 3 cents a mile rate.
