MONEY NEEDED FOR THE HEATING PLANT

Generous Sums Advanced by Many Persons, but Full Amount Required Has Not Yet Been Raised.

Work is steadily progressing on remodeling the building at Twenty-fourth and Wirt streets, which the Women's Christian association hopes to occupy June 1 as an enlarged Old People's home. Generous which will cost between \$1,200 and \$1,500. This is practically a necessity, if the aged people, who need plenty of warmth, are to place much more cheaply while the house is being remodeled than later on.

This work appeals to all and the need of a larger home has long been realized by all interested in the present Burt street home. There is no other place in Omaha where old people, deprived of comfortable homes, either through the loss of friends or poverty-often both-can again find a real home in their declining years.
