SENATE HEARS WILLIAMS CASE

Protest Against Iowa Foot Baller by Minnesota is Taken Up-Conference Rules Must Govern.

IOWA CITY, Ia., May 9.—(Special.)—The last echo of the famous Clyde Williams protest, wherein Captain Clyde Williams of the Iowa 1901 foot ball team was protested by Minnesota and declared ineligible by the conference of the Big Nine, was heard at the meeting of the University of Iowa senate today.

The university senate deals with the relations of Iowa with other colleges. At the request of friends of Clyde Williams, a proposition was laid before the senate to change the ruling of the senate made in 1859, when Iowa joined the conference, that conference rules should govern in all intercollegiate athletic contests of the university.

collegiate athletic contests of the university.

The change was advocated in order to allow Williams to play on the base ball team with nonconference colleges. It was argued by the advocates of the change that other conference colleges play ineligible men in their nonconference games and that nonconference teams with which Iowa contests play men ineligible under the conference rules, and that it was only fair that Iowa be allowed to compete on equal terms with these in her nonconference games.

The proposition was voted down by the senate and it was declared again that conference rules govern lows in its intercollegiate games, whether with conference or nonconference colleges.
