HARRIMAN STOPS A STRIKE

Promises to Keep Piece Work Out of Southern Pacific Shops

UNION PACIFIC DISPUTE MAY BE SETTLED

Civil Federation to Take Matter Up—Many Labor Disturbances Occur in Many Parts of Country, Although Some End.

On specific promises of concessions by President E. H. Harriman and intervention by Senator Mark A. Hanna, president of the Civil Federation, the Southern Pacific boiler makers at the eleventh hour voted not to strike yesterday.

This information came Sunday to President Ed Kennedy of the local boiler makers in a telegram from Secretary-Treasurer Gilthorpe of the International Brotherhood of Boiler Makers and Iron Ship Builders, who lives at Kansas City.

Mr. Harriman's proposition was accepted by the Southern Pacific boiler makers and the strike is "off" for the present.

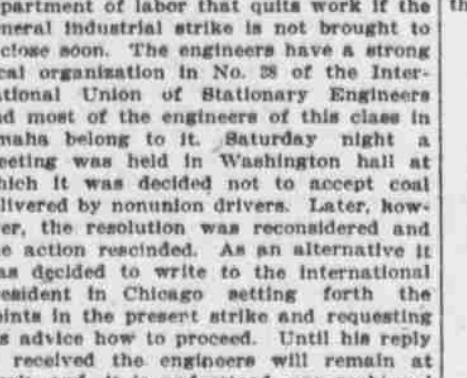
