

DEBATE NAME OF THE CHURCH

Nebraska Episcopalians Talk About the Change Proposed.

NO OFFICIAL OR DEFINITE ACTION TAKEN

Clergy and Lay Delegates Hold an Informal Session Prior to Assembly of the Diocesan Convention.

Preliminary to the meeting of the diocese of Nebraska of the Episcopal church at Trinity cathedral on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday of next week, the clergy and lay delegates to the convention from Omaha and other churches met informally at the home of Clement Chase Wednesday evening to discuss the change of name of the Episcopal church.

The thirty-sixth annual meeting of the diocese of Nebraska which begins Tuesday morning at Trinity cathedral begins at 10:30 in the morning. The first day will be given up to the annual meeting of the Women's Auxiliary of the Board of Missions, the annual reports and the annual election will be finished during the morning and in the afternoon there will be an address by Miss Louie Higgins, who has been a missionary in Liberia for several years.

The opening service of the council will occur at 10:30 of the second day, the clergy and the choir, both vested, and the lay delegates marching to the cathedral in procession. Rev. Dr. Arthur S. Lloyd of New York, general secretary of domestic and foreign missions, will deliver the opening sermon. In the afternoon the council will assemble in the crypt of the cathedral and organize for business, appoint standing committees and hear the address of the bishop coadjutor.

Dr. Lloyd will deliver an address on mission work in the afternoon, as will also several other of the clergy and the lay delegates will be taken for missionary work in the diocese. Wednesday evening the clergy and laity of Omaha will tender a banquet to the out-of-town delegates and clergy.

The third day's session will be given up to general business work and the finishing of the business affairs of the diocese by the council.

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PEET BROTHERS WILL COME

Commercial Club Committee Learns They Will Probably Establish Rendering Plant.

The recent visit of A. W. Peet, of the Peet Brothers soap company of Kansas City, chronicled exclusively in The Bee, has borne fruit. At yesterday's meeting of the Commercial club's executive committee the rendering plant was made that the Peets have practically closed for a site and arranged to establish a rendering works in Omaha. The investment will be at least \$125,000.

Secretary Utz announced also that that a wholesale military firm which has been looking for a location in Omaha has found suitable buildings and probably will establish itself soon.

After lengthy correspondence he has announced the Peets, who were accompanied by a man "of the right sort" wants to erect in Omaha an elevator and cereal mill with equipment for preparing special cereal foods. "He has both means and experience," said Mr. Utz, "and looks with favor upon the project and the committee meeting in behalf of promoters of the manufacture of heating stoves and ranges constructed on a plan which will, it is said, save 35 per cent on fuel cost. ENJOINS WOMAN FROM TALKING

Judge Baxter Signs Latest Novelty in Way of Temporary Restraining Order.

The latest restraining order issued by a Judge of the district court in Omaha enjoins a woman from talking. It was issued yesterday upon the complaint of L. Oliphant Dodge of Twenty-first and Nicholas streets, who has appealed to the courts to protect her from the words and actions of one Mrs. E. Berge, a neighbor. The allegations of the petition are that the plaintiff owns an apartment house at Twenty-first and Nicholas streets, in which seventeen families in addition to herself reside; that the defendant has upon numerous occasions visited the premises and by talking to the neighbors has caused some of them to announce their intention of leaving the apartments; that she has interfered with the property in different ways all to the injury of the plaintiff.

The order signed by Judge Baxter is made returnable June 10 and in the meantime the defendant is enjoined from entering upon the premises of the plaintiff, from stopping in front of the premises for the purpose of annoying the plaintiff and from talking to any of the tenants of the apartment house about the plaintiff in any manner.
