Candlemass Colt Beats Bad News by Single Length. JUDGE HIMES FALTERS UNDER BIG WEIGHT

Six Horses Are Bunched Together All the Way, Making it Look as if Any One Might Prove Victor.

CINCINNATI, May 20 .- Over a fast track and under a cloudy sky, T. C. McDowell's Candlemass colt, Woodlake, carrying 114 pounds, won the Latonia derby today. The time was 2:35%. The value of the stake was \$7,550.

Nine horses faced the starter and were sent away to a poor start. Bad News set the pace to the stretch, where he was overtaken by Woodlake. The two fought it out to the wire, Woodlake winning by a leagth. Bad News was second, a half length in front of Tancred.

The race was all that could be desired from a spectacular standpoint. The field, with the exception of the last three, were fairly well bunched all the way and it looked as if any one of the first six had a chance after they had gone half the distance. Judge Himes, winner of the Louisville derby, faltered under his heavy im post of 127 pounds and after running well up in the bunch for a mile and a quarter began to tire, although he held his position, was plainly evident that he was under punishment and could not gain any

ground on the leaders. Maxie Blumenthal, the colt with which Ed Corrigan hoped to win the famous stake, was a sad disappointment. He shied as the barrier went up, was practically left and refused to extend himself during the journey. Tom Hall broke in front of the bunch, but before going half a mile he

showed his class by falling back in last position and was twenty lengths behind Sailor's Dream all the way. Woodlake's victory was a popular one

This is the first race he has won as a 3year-old. Bad News would have had a fighting chance at the finish had there been a better rider on his back.
