COUNCIL BLUFFS.

QUESTION MANAWA TITLES

Creditors of Colonel Reed Lay Claim to Land on Lake Front.

SAY MOTOR COMPANY DOES NOT OWN IT

Argument Made as Demurrer to Answer of Portland Gold Mining Company in Tax Suit.

Suit was begun in the district court yesterday by the Exchange National bank of Little Rock, Ark., and Charles F. Pense, one of the officers of the bank, questioning the title of the motor company to eighty acres of land at Lake Manawa. Judgment was secured by the Little Rock bank and Pense yesterday in the district court against Colonel F. C. Reed, the former owner of the Lake Manawa Railroad company and the resort at the lake on notes given several years ago, the amount of the judgment being close upon \$6,000. The bank and Pense ask that the judgment be declared a lien on the eighty acres which adjoin Regatta Place at Lake Manawa and which formerly were part of the property of the Lake Manawa Ice company.

The Lake Manawa Ice company was incorporated in March, 1900, and Colonel F. C. Reed was the owner of all or the greater part of the stock of the company and it is now claimed by the plaintiffs in the suit brought yesterday against the motor company that the Lake Manawa Ice company failed to make any settlement of its affairs or to wind up its business or divide the assets among the stockholders and consequently the company still holds the fee title to the eighty acres, which are said to be of the value of \$10,000, in trust for its stockholders and creditors.

In addition to asking that their judgment be declared a lien on the eighty acres the plaintiffs ask that the motor company be required to make an accounting of the rents, profits and uses of the property and pay same into court for the use and benefit of the plaintiffs. The demurrer to the answer of the defendant in the suit of William A. Reed, treasurer of Pottawattamie county, against the Portland Gold Mining company of Colorado, was argued and submitted before Judge Wheeler in the district court yesterday. The court took the case under advisement. This is the case in which Pottawattamie county seeks to compel the mining company, which is incorporated under the laws of Iowa and has its principal place of business in Council Bluffs, to furnish its books and names of stockholders so that it can be assessed for taxation here. The Portland company was represented by former Governor Thomas of Colorado and Dillon Ross, its local attorney, while County Attorney Killpack and Hon. A. S. Hazlett appeared for the county treasurer.

Mrs. Elsie Helton filed a petition for divorce from Willis Helton to whom she was married in Mills county November 20, 1888. She makes statutory charges against her husband.

C. A. Morgan secured a temporary injunction restraining the Dewey Furniture

company and Sheriff Cousins from selling the stock of Morgan & Klein, attached to satisfy a judgment secured against R. Morgan & Sons, in 1892.

IOWA FARMERS HEAR PAPERS

Interesting Subjects Discussed Before Monona County Institute in Session at Onawa.

ONAWA, Ia., May 23.—(Special Telegram.)—The second day of the Monona county farmers' institute opened with an increased attendance. George D. Forest, secretary of the State Corn Growers' association, delivered an address on agriculture in connection with the St. Louis exposition. O. J. Easton of Whiting spoke on "Poultry Raising for Profit," and F. R. Hackett on "Dairying on the Farm." He was followed by Prof. Holden of Ames, who made the principal address of the day on "Corn and Farm Culture," illustrating the lecture by charts showing the care of all kinds in the various stages of development. Many farmers are present from the counties of Woodbury and Ida. The institute is a decided success. Will C. Whiting was elected permanent president and W. L. Wiley treasurer. The election of a secretary was deferred. The next institute will be held in February at Castana.

WOODBURY COUNTY FLOODED

Small Grain Greatly Injured and Anxiety Over Corn Prospects.

WOODSBURY CITY, Ia., May 23.—(Special Telegram.)—Woodbury county is almost entirely under water. The small grain is greatly injured, if not ruined, and the corn crop is threatened. The Little Sioux, the Whiskey and Wolf creeks are on a rampage and overflowing their banks. A meeting of farmers was held at Luton last night to take measures to open a new ditch to drain the lowlands. The big ditch secretary was charging over Mrs. Kruger and instead of draining the lands is now flooding them. A rain Friday night, accompanied by a severe windstorm, developed into a small tornado at Hornick and destroyed small outbuildings and removed large buildings from their foundations. The weather station here announces the rainfall for the month within .05 of an inch of exceeding the record for that month. The conditions threatening the crops of Woodbury county are serious in the extreme.

Looks Bad for Woman. CRESCO, Ia., May 23.—(Special.)—Unless the defense can put up a stronger story than already sprung Mrs. Sofia Kruger will be convicted of murder of her husband, Gustav on the night of April 18, in the opinion of the county attorney. Mrs. Kruger's stories of her husband's disappearance have differed. She said he had probably drowned himself, then that he had gone visiting and a third tale was that he had visited a relative, and she left the impression that he might have been killed by caving in of a well. Mrs. Kruger has kept quiet since her arrest, and her counsel appear confident of clearing her. Kruger's body was found in the river. One story is that he had gone fishing and was drowned, but the officers found blood on the floor, stove and furniture. Kruger's skull showed several holes and fractures, and it is surmised by the state that his wife killed him with a pick, hauled his body to the river and tied rocks to it, as weights were found on it by the men who dragged the river. Preliminary examination resulted in blaming over Mrs. Kruger to the grand jury, which meets June 9.
