





\$19,400 Germany. Imports from the United States in 1896 amounted to \$4,562,164; in 1897, to \$12,053,750,

and in 1901, to over \$23,000,000. Of the \$23, 000,000 paid to us in 1901, \$11,000,000 was for oll cake, oleomargarine, pork, lard and wheat. A great variety of other goods

was purchased with the remaining \$13. 000,000. For instance, the demand for American merchandise shows a steady in-

crease; Danish business men write their letters on American typewriters and keep their cash accounts on American cash registers; the American bicycle is being used to a great extent; the American automobile is finding a place in this market, and American goods of all descriptions, if reliable and up to date, find a ready sale in Denmark. Legation Building at Peking.

Pending the erection of new legation uildings for the United States in Peking the legation of this country will occupy temporarily an old Chinese temple situated on the grounds allotted to the United States by China. The premises heretofore occupied by the United States legation have become the property of the Korean government. Secretary Hay called on the comptroller

of the treasury to decide whether the sum appropriated by congress for rent of legaion buildings in Peking could be used to

Pepair the temple. Today the comptroller decided that while the question is not en tirely free from doubt, on the statement of facts submitted, and in view of the important public interests involved, he is c

the opinion that the appropriation may be used in the way suggested. No Move in Canal Matter.

The State department has no intention of making any move in the matter of the Panama canal negotiations until the Coombian congress meets June 10 and has given some evidence of its disposition toward the treaty. President Marroquin, it is understood,

satisfied himself before calling the Colombian congress in special session that the government would be able to command safe majority upon the question of ratifi-

cation. It is known that considerable opposition has developed since the call was issued, but it is believed here that this opposition in Colombia is based on ignorince and unwarranted suspicion of the de-



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




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
