South Omaha Plants Rushed Because of

Kansas City Situation.

NO ADVANCE IN MEAT PRICES LIKELY Messrs, Cudaby and Howe Talk of the Outlook and Neither Sees Any Reason for Increase in

Retail Cost.

Live stock formerly sent to Kansas City. St. Joseph and Nebraska City is now being diverted to the South Omaha market. The Kansas City yards cannot handle anything, while St. Joseph and Nebraska City are badly crippled. Packers here have little, if anything, to do with diverting the stock, as the shippers themselves are consigning it

to South Omaha. E. A. Cudahy said yesterday to a Bee reporter that his plant at South Omaha is supplying all of the beef houses and the

trade formerly supplied by the Kansas City house "Our M Taliaferre left last night for Chleago, said Mr. Cudahy. "From there he will go to St. Louis and thence to Kansas City, where he will take charge of the work to be done on our plant there. We expect to be ready to slaughter hogs. cattle and sheep at the Kansas City plant by Tuesday next. The only question now will the stock yards at Kansas City be in position to handle live stock. At Kanmas City we are working night and day placing the plant in shape to resume opera-Where we are short of electric

power we will substitute small steam engines temporarily." As for the loss at his plant, Mr. Cudshy said that he had no idea what it will be until a thorough examination has been When asked if there would be any further advance in the retail price of meat Mr. Cudahy said that the retail price is governed by the price paid for live stock. As far as T can see," he said, "there is nothing to force the retail price any higher

than it is. In fact I do not look for an ncrease over the existing prices." General Manager R. C. Howe of the Aryour company said he is supplying his outhern trade from this point and that his ouse here is running full blast. "We exsect," said Mr. Howe, "to have our Kansas City plant in operation in about ten days. Now that the river has commenced to go down it will fall rapidly and there will soon be no difficulty in reaching the plants. Repair work and renovating is now going on at our Kansas City house, and we will be ready to commence slaughtering just as oon as the stock yards can handle the stuff." Mr. Howe could see no reason for

a further advance in the price of meat or account of the flood. "We will be rushed here possibly for about two weeks," continued Mr. Howe, "and then the stock diverted to this market will go back into the old channels." About 100 beef and hog butchers arrived here yesterday from Kansas City and nearly all found work at once. There will
