DECIDES TO DIG THE DITCH

Board Takes Final Action on the Long Talked of Proposition.

HARRISON COUNTY TO PAY ITS SHARE

Thomas Tostevin Appointed Engineer in Charge of the Work to Look After the Interests of the County.

Harrison county's two ditches, known as the Willow Creek and the Allen Creek ditches, will be constructed to connect with the ditch in Pottawattamie county, which will be known as the Boyer cut-off ditch. The Willow creek ditch will start about William Riddel, 875 Harrison street, was reported to the Board of Health yesterday as suffering from smallpox. He was quarantined at his home.

It is estimated that the total cost of the improvement will be \$87,500, although these figures may be increased, as a number of owners of land through which the ditches will pass are demanding greater damages than allowed by the appraisers. 




