TRADE STILL KEEPING UP EVENTS ON RUNNING TRACKS Dun's Review Reports Steady Demand at

Iron and Steel Still Prosper, Though Cottons and Textiles Move Slowly, and Footwear Shows Rea-

Steel Consumption Great.

While the demand for structural steel has diminished, there is a notable inquiry for rails and plates. Machinery and hardware lines are doing remarkably well for the season, which is usually quiet in these departments. Coke ovens are surpassing all previous records for activity and the output of anthracite coal promises to establish a new high water mark this year above \$6,000,000 tons.

Cotton Goods Go Up.

Cotton goods again average slightly higher prices, the advances being insisted upon by producers on account of the raw material and are in no degree attributable to increased anxiety to place contracts on the part of buyers. Aside from a more liberal demand for print cloth, yarn fabrics for converting and printing purposes, there is no evidence of activity. On the other hand, supplies are not accumulating at the mills, owing to curtailment of production, not only voluntarily but by strikes and the storms.
