TRADE STILL KEEPING UP Dun's Review Reports Steady Demand at Fair Prices.

FLOODS AFFECT RAILROAD EARNINGS Iron and Steel Still Prosper, Though Cottons and Textiles Move Slowly, and Footwear Shows Reasonable Activity.

NEW YORK, June 12.—R. G. Dun & Co.'s Weekly Review of Trade tomorrow will report that the iron and steel industry is prospering, and that the cotton and textile industries are moving slowly.

That furnace stocks of pig iron increased only 40,000 tons despite the unprecedented output testifies to the great consumption of the steel industry. Speculations are without foundation, a condition which much business is delayed by labor troubles, in case of a general settlement of these conflicts there would be a resumption of work on many buildings and including the requirements of railroads a heavy tonnage would be bought.

It is an evidence of the future that blast furnace operations are preparing for production beyond all previous maximum figures. While the demand for structural steel has diminished there is a steady inquiry for rails and plates. Machinery and hardware lines are doing remarkably well in the season, which is usually quiet in these departments. Coke ovens are surging with activity, and the output of anthracite coal promises to establish a new high water mark this year at about \$6,000,000.

Cotton Goods Go Up. Cotton goods again average slightly higher prices, the advances being insisted upon by the producers, who are in a position to demand a much higher price for their goods, and are in no degree attributable to increased anxiety to place contracts on hand for next spring. On the other hand, supplies are not accumulating at the mills, owing to curtailment of production, and are being sold off by strikes and the storms.

Conservation prevails among buyers of staple woolsens and worsteds, while little interest is shown in the woolens market. The wool trade is quiet, and the conditions are concerned, carpets are the most satisfactory of the home products, and the leather and hides are strong.

Flour this week was 215 in the United States, against 182 last week, and 14 in Canada, compared with 20 a year ago.

BRADSTREET IS ENCOURAGING. Says Even Wholesale Trade Shows Some Improvement. NEW YORK, June 12.—Bradstreet's tomorrow will say: Weather crop report and labor conditions all show improvement, but business is still feeble, and recovery has been overestimated.

The business generally is still weak, but iron production is at the highest point ever recorded, but the iron and steel industry has given way to a firmer tone, though advance buying is still the exception. Stocks of iron are not accumulating, and production at present is of enormous volume.

Railroad earnings are good as a whole, though, as expected, the western floods have curtailed June gross receipts somewhat. May gross receipts show a gain of 12 per cent, as against a gain of 14.5 per cent in April, but following a gain of 9 per cent May, 1902, over 1901.

A freer movement of spot goods is noticed in cottons and jobbers report a fair amount of business in the east. For futures, however, prices are high and business is done sparingly.

Ginghams and prints are moving well this season. Re-orders of men's woolsens are being made, but business is still backward. Wool is steady, but business is better, and is moving quite freely.

Shoe shipments from the east are heavy, and the shoe trade is doing well. The shoe trade is dull, the cheaper grades particularly so. Groceries are doing well, and a better demand for refined sugar at an advance of 10 cents per 100 pounds. Coffee is firm.
