AFFAIRS AT SOUTH OMAHA

Shortage of City Funds Makes Improvements Doubtful—Club Discouraged

BUILDING OF ALL KINDS AT STANDSTILL

No Money to Clean Downtown Streets—Government Increases Live Stock Certainty—Magie City Gossip.

Officers and members of the various improvement clubs are beginning to get discouraged, as there seems to be little if any prospect of securing long-desired improvements this year.

For nearly two years the East Side Improvement club has been working for the extension of the Third street bridge to Missouri avenue. While promises have been made that the work would be done, material has not arrived and those living in this section of the city have about given up hope that anything along that line will be done this summer.

The drill team of camp No. 106, Modern Woodmen of America left last night over the Rock Island road for Indianapolis to attend the national convention of the order. The team will be gone one week.

It is the same with the Southern Live Improvement club. Promises to extend the Albright car service to the county line have been made time and again, but still there is no sign of the work being done.

West of the tracks the same cry is being made. More hydrants and lights are wanted. In every case city officials are compelled to give the same reply—no funds.

Building in South Omaha is practically at a standstill. Not a single building permit was issued last week. It is true that repairs are being made and a few small dwellings erected, but a majority of the local contractors are idle.

Contractors assert that this summer will be the dulllest one in years as few have any orders at all. Labor troubles are one cause of the scarcity of building here, while the lack of money in the city treasury prevents any improvements by the municipality.

Paved Streets Dirty. All of the paved streets in the business portion of the city are in a filthy condition.
