MANNER OF DEATH MYSTERY

Coroner's Inquest Throws No Light on Killing of Mrs. Sayles.

UNABLE TO FIX BLAME FOR ACCIDENT

Neither Members of Switching Crew Nor Bystanders Saw the Tragedy—Difference of Opinion Regarding Speed.

The inquest held yesterday by Coroner Treynor over Mrs. Jane Sayles, the aged woman who was run down and killed by an Illinois Central switch engine Friday morning at the Avenue B crossing resulted in the jury being unable to fix the blame for the accident.

The witnesses examined were Engineer Frank G. Alexander, Fireman C. R. Liebig, Conductor H. G. Meek, Yardmaster J. E. Wright and Switchman W. F. Myers and J. F. Grace, all four of whom were on the footboard of the engine. Not one of them saw the accident, and were not aware of the fact that Mrs. Sayles had been run over until they saw her dead body on the body lay. From where he stood he was unable to see that the woman at the crossing was Mrs. Sayles.

The funeral of Mrs. Sayles will be held this afternoon at 2:30 o'clock from the residence of her daughter, Mrs. Michael Powell, 230 North Seventeenth street, and in the evening at 8 o'clock from the First Methodist church.

The Knights and Ladies of the Maccabees will assemble in their hall in the Brown block at 2:30 p. m. and proceed from there to the different cemeteries, where ritualistic services will be held, and the graves of departed members decorated.

The services today at the First Congregational church will be commemorative of the semi-centennial anniversary of the organization of the congregation and will be held at 10:30 a. m. and 8 p. m. In the morning Rev. John Askin, pastor of the Congregational church at Tabor, Ia., and a former pastor of the church here, will preach the anniversary sermon.

The members of the Christian Endeavor society will have a special service, in which the several pastors attending the semi-centennial anniversary will participate. "Gold or God" will be the subject discussed and a general invitation to all members of the Christian Endeavor societies in the city to attend is extended.

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The reports from about forty of the counties have been received already. These are generally the smaller counties where the work can be done soonest. They show that the real estate valuations as made by the assessors this year average about \$4.80 an acre increase over the valuation of two years ago, when the real estate and assessments were made. At this rate the increase in valuation on real estate, exclusive of town lots, would be in the state over \$238,000,000. But as the larger counties come in this average will be materially increased, as many of the counties yet to report show an average increase of over \$10 an acre on the land assessment. Some of the largest increases of this year are in these counties: Pocahontas, \$11.00; Benton, \$10.33; Butler, \$10.05; Greene, \$10.27; Winnebago, \$9.90. Allamakee shows an increase of only \$1.15 an acre. The average valuation placed on acreage in Iowa two years ago was a little over \$3, but this year it will go to about \$4 or \$4.25 an acre.
