Commissioner Utt of Commercial Club Talks on Its Effect.

HOW THE MOVE WILL HELP THE JOBBERS

Omaha Firms Will Get Into a Wider Expanse of Territory Because They Are More Accessible.

"The elimination of the bridge tolls, which went into effect yesterday, making the same rates as Council Bluffs from Omaha to points in Iowa, has a manifold advantage to Omaha shippers," said Secre tary Utt of the Commercial club. "In the tion shows the roads are dealing fairly with us. The total charges have been an eyesore to our shippers ever since the first bridge was built and have been a source of continual contention.

"The new rates will permit Omaha jobbers to cover twice the territory that they had before their removal. The probable saying to shippers, based on the present volume of business, will be \$50,000 a year, and with the increase in business the benefits will be proportionate. In making shipments quick service is equally important with low rates. The difficulty has been that shipments have been delayed because cars are loaded for distribution on different divisions on the lines in Iowa, and the volume of shipments, being small, in many instances shipments were detained twenty-four hours in Council Bluffs for onsolidation with cars from that point. Railways do not like to haul local cars that contain less than 12,000 pounds freight, and when it is less the freight is held until there is sufficient to make a full distributing carload. Another reason why the volume of business will increase from Omaha is that the Omaha jobbers pay 2 cents per 100 pounds to haul to Omaha depots who have paid 8 cents per 100 pounds to Council Bluffs depots in order to get quick service. Under the present arrangement they will save 1 cent per 100 pounds in transfer charges and 5 cents per 100 pounds on the bridge tolls, so that what formerly cost them 8 cents will now only ost them 2 cents, and the saving will be 6 cents per 100 pounds.

Johbers and the Arbitrary. "As a matter of fact, the Omaha jobbe did not directly pay the 5-cent bridge toll, because the retail dealer in lowa pays the freight, but indirectly Omaha jobbers will benefited by the removal of the tolla, which have been a constant source of an nevance both in the selling of goods and adjusting small claims. For example, an implement dealer of this city paid last year \$650 in making small allowances gainst implement dealers in Council Bluffe. It must be considered that the in-rates to Sloux City, Council Bluffs and Omaha are the same; therefore the selling price of goods is about the same, and on groceries, hardware and implements 5 cents per 100 pounds is frequently all the profit there is in the business. Omaha has never contended for any advantage as against any other city, but has asked equality, and the basis of its complaint has been that an Council Bluffs and Stoux City had the same o-rates and the same out-rates as Omaha to points in Nebrasks, Omaha should be en the same basis of equality with them to points in Towa."


Cyrus Smith.
