PROMISES TO TRY AND LIVE

Commissioners of Insanity Decide that Woman is Not Insane.

MAKES THREE ATTEMPTS TO KILL HERSELF

Despondent Over Being Held on Chicken Stealing Charge and Inability to Secure Amount of Bail Asked.

Following the third unsuccessful attempt of Mrs. Lizzie Thorsen, an inmate of the county jail, to end her life, Jailer Martin decided yesterday that the woman was a fit subject for examination by the commissioners on insanity and accordingly fixed an early date for the hearing.

The hearing board decided that the woman was not a fit subject to be committed to the insane asylum and ordered her discharged on her promising to refrain from attempting to take her life. She was accordingly taken back to her cell in the county jail.

Mrs. Thorsen is awaiting trial on a charge of being implicated in a number of chicken thefts for which her husband, John Thorsen, is now serving a two years' sentence in the penitentiary at Fort Madison.

TROOPS READY FOR DUBUQUE

Cummins Orders State Militia to Prepare to Quell Strike Riots.

DES MOINES, June 17.—Governor Cummins tonight issued orders to hold the National Guard companies at Waterloo, Independence and Maquoketa in readiness for street duty in case of need to quell disorders growing out of the street car strike. He also sent a proclamation to Dubuque calling on the people to refrain from acts of violence and announcing his intention to use all the resources of the state to prevent injury to persons or property. Governor Cummins' action was taken after consultation at Iowa City today with Senator Allison, whose home is in Dubuque.

DUBUQUE, Ia., June 17.—Street cars did not run today and Dubuque is comparatively quiet tonight. Many people were on the streets, but crowds were not allowed to congregate. Governor Cummins wired this evening that three companies of militia would be sent. The troops are expected in the morning.

THREE KILLED IN COLLISION

The matter was considered two years ago and a bill introduced in the legislature, but it met with little favor.

Plan for Decoration at St. Louis. Members of the State Capitol commission and of the St. Louis commission, at a conference today, laid plans for a decoration of the Iowa building now being erected at the St. Louis exposition in a way that will surpass all other similar decorations. The matter was laid before the capitol commission in a letter from L. A. Palmer, in charge of the art work for the Iowa commission, in which he suggested that the capitol commission loan the exposition commission the mural decorations which are purchased for the interior of the capitol building. It will probably be finished and installed by the time the exposition opens. This suggestion is looked upon with favor by both commissions. It will be a way in which the state of Iowa can have a most beautiful interior with comparatively small expense to the state.
