Strength in Corn Pit is Feature of Board of Trade Operations.

HEAVY BUYING OFFSETS WEATHER Condition of Trade and Quotations on

Wheat Advances, Oats Unchanged, While Provisions After Dull Day Close but Shade Lower Under Bullish Grain News.

CHICAGO, June 17.—The strength and activity in the corn pit was the feature today on the Board of Trade, July corn closing he higher. September wheat was up he and September oats unchanged, while provisions were a shade to 2½c lower.

Trading in wheat early in the day was decidedly duil and with favorable harvesting weather and outside markets generally low, with cables showing no particular interest, the market during the first half of the session showed a declining tendency. July opened 1464c higher, and September a stade to 4c lower at 734c 735c to 735c, the latter selling later to 735c. Toward noon the sentiment in the pit assumed a buillish aspect, and prices railled, July advancing to 755c and September to 745c. The late strength in corn, together with reports of a lack of moisture in the northwest, was the reason for the selling. September closed up 5c at 745c. Clestrances of wheat and flour were equal to 333,600 bu. Primary receipts were 311,300 bu., against 551,600 bu. a year ago. Minneapolis and Duluth reported receipts of 15 cars, none of contract grade, made total receipts for three points of 25s cars, against 36 cars last week and 311 cars a year ago.
