NEW YORK MAY SUE FOR DAVIS Pulliam Strongly Protests to Johnson Against Americans' Stealing

NEW YORK, June 25.—President Pulliam of the National league has written to President Ban Johnson of the American league an open letter setting forth a protest of the New York National club against the New York American's playing Elberfield after he was awarded to the Detroit club under the peace agreement between the leagues. President Pulliam characterizes this as a breach of the agreement.
