CHICAGO, July 1.-Two world's records were broken at Washington Park today. Alan-a-Dale, running without the lash of a whip, lowered the world's record for one mile to 1.375. He accomplianed the feat in the first race of the day and handily beat Savable. In the firth race Rag Tag set the mark for seven and a half furlongs at 1.325. Alan-a-Dale set the pace all the way. Fire and Police Board Draws New Lines for the Evil Resorts.

# **NO MOVE FOR MOST CONSPICUOUS HOUSES**

Matter of Compelling Assignation Houses to Move Into the District Will Be Taken Up by the Board Later.

As announced exclusively by The Bee last week, the Fire and Police commission will 'reform'' the lines of the "burnt district." A start was made at an adjourned meeting yesterday afternoon when this motion, by unanimous vote. Mayor Moores and Measrs Broatch and Thomas present, and Messrs. MoHugh and Spratlen absent, but in favor of it, was passed:

n favor of it, was passed: That the chief of police be instructed to suppress all prostitution outside the folsuppress all prostitution outside the fol-lowing limits: A line commencing at the center of block 5 on Webster street and ex-tending south through the centers of blocks 7, 35, 69, 73 and 90 to the alley; east through the alley from the center of block 90 through blocks 91 and 82 to the center of block 30; south to the north side of block 100; therefrom east indefinitely.

This means that all houses will now be emoved at least one-half block from the Dodge street car line. By streets the new district will begin at Webster street midway between Twelfth and Thirteenth, thence south through the center of the blocks to the center of the block between Capitol avenue and Dodge street, thence east midway between Capitol avenue and Dodge to a line midway between Ninth and Tenth streets, thence south to Douglas and east to the tracks and lumber yards at about Eighth street. About a dogen houses, mostly small ones, will be affected and will have to move.

#### Ninth Street Left Alone.

No official action was taken on them, but it was informally stated that the houses on Ninth, between Douglas and Dodge, or at least those in the south half of the block, will be considered in the near future. They have been among the most conspicu ous in the district, it was admitted, but the question, members of the board stated, is a large one and action on it will be in sections.

The matter of compelling assignation houses to move into the district, it was stated, would also be considered at a future meeting. The new district is in fact larger than the old one, the extensions to the north being greater than the cuts made in the south end of the district, the explanation given being that the present lines are too small and have already been overstepped. The present extension to the north will also, when it is thought by the board advisable to make them, allow for more cuts in the south end of the district. Two other motions, which were unanimously carried, made official and put in the record the verbal instructions given by the board Monday night. They read:

board Monday night. They read: That the chief of police is instructed to prohibit soliciting by women on the streets; to prohibit women from visiting or fre-quenting saloons and to close the saloons where proprietors volate his instructions in this respect. That the chief of police is instructed to cause the removal of slot machines and musical instruments from saloons and to prohibit entertainments by itinerant mu-sicians therein.


#### Bitten by Dog She Teased.
