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Constitution is Put Out of Business and

Rel ance Suffers Slight Injury. COLUMBIA LOSES MAN OVERBOARD

Newport Contests Are Cancelled Boats Being Ordered to Remain Quiet Till New York Club's Cruise.

NEWPORT, R. I., July 2 .- For the first time in the history of American 90-footers a fatal accident occurred today. Carl B. Olsen, a seaman on the old cup defender Columbia, was washed from the bowsprit just before the yacht reached the first turn in today's race and was drowned.

When the yacht lifted from a big wave into which it had plunged, Olsen was seen almost under the stem, clinging to the bobstay, but before aid could be given him the sloop dipped into another comber and he was not seen afterward.

Captain Miller of Columbia thinks Olser was struck by the overhang of the craft as it came smashing down and knocked insensible. Columbia came into the wind instantly. Two life buoys were thrown into the water and the tender launched os quickly as possible. Two men jumped into the tender and rowed 'round for twenty minutes ready to pick Olsen up if he came to the surface. Three sailors swarmed up the mast and looked for some sign of the unfortunate man, but without success.

New Races Cancelled.

At 9 tonight the committee posted the following bulletin at the club station: The Newport series for 90-footers will not be finished. There will be no more racing until the yachts start on the New York Yacht club's cruise.

Today's race was also marred by a mishap to Constitution. Soon after the start it carried away the jaws of its gaff and the great steel spar, swinging forward, buckled in the center.

The main sail was ripped clear across several times and rendered practically worthless. It was the best mainsail the boat had spread this season and the third that had been tried this year.

Reliance received the severest buffeting it has had since being launched. The sea was terrible for racing yachts and when the yacht reached its moorings it was noticed that it had a big dent five feet long in the plating close to the waterline on the port bow. The indentation was similar to that Constitution sustained two years

Reliance sailed splendidly. The wind blew more than twenty miles an hour and all three yachts found they could not even carry small working topsails to windward. so they went off under the three lower sails only. It was the stiffest breeze and hardest sea that the boats have been out in since the season's racing began, and had there been no accidents the record of a thirty-mile triangular course would have been cut down considerably. As it was Reliance with no craft to push it and with only a No. 1 jib topsail hoisted, in ad dition to the three lower sails, came to the finish line from the second turn in 47 minutes, 10 seconds, the fastest ten-mile leg ever sailed. The rigging and spars of Reliance went through the test in splendid style, not a strand being started. Results:
