Otto Schneiderwind.

Otto Schneiderwind, for thirty-five years a resident of Omaha, died suddenly at 7 o'clock yesterday morning at his home, 222 Seventh street. Death was due to heart failure. The funeral will be at 2 o'clock Saturday from the family residence, interment at Forest Lawn cemetery. Deceased leaves a wife and seven children, Mrs. Mathie Eberly of this city, Mrs. Emma Miller of Des Moines, Mrs. Edith Haines of Denver and Otto, Fred, Theodore and Herman, all of Omaha. Mr. Schneiderwind came to this country from Saxony when he was 25 years of age and fought through the civil war.
