

MILLIONAIRES CATCH TWO

Sunday's Double-Header Falls Into the Colorado Springs Baskets

BOTH GAMES PLAYED WITHOUT AN ERROR

Victors Win by Superior Work with the Bat, While the Hourketties Fail to Make Enough Safe Hits.

The Millionaires cleaned up yesterday's games and never left a smell for Omaha, but they had to work to do it. McNeely pitched the double header and received perfect support, as did both of the local pitchers. Ray McNeely kept the hits scattered on the local boys throughout the nine innings, while the Millionaires bunched their hits on Sanders in the tenth of the first game and on Companion in the sixth and seventh innings of the second. Both teams were all-star aggregations in the field and played snappy ball every minute of the time. Genies at short probably came closer to being a particular luminary than any other player, making four hits out of eight times at the bat and scoring nine runs in the first game. Grayville made a superb catch at the beginning of the second game when he dragged "Dusty" Miller's hot act out of the clouds and spotted a triple.

Big Crowd Present. With 5,000 people in the seats and strung out along the side lines, the game opened up in championship form. In the third Colorado Springs garnered a tally. McNeely unlimbered his frame and came out to do battle with Sanders' curves. When he had through he had reached second base, Fleming, gaunt of frame and cadaverous of expression, poked his bat into the face of a twister and sacrificed himself for McNeely's sake. Franks gathered, a base on four wide ones and Congalton brought Mike in on a fly to catch the second base for that inning and Omaha dug base until the ninth.

But the sixth was where the doings and fireworks were tipped for.

With one down, Franks singled and stretched on toward home a moment later on Congalton's double, but was pinched by a Salt Lake City block when coming in home. Then Bill Everett singled and Hill brought the two stragglers in with a triple. That made it 3 to 1, but for the sake of being dead sure of the game they garnered one more in the next. Swadlow drew a base on four bad ones and ambled around to ninth. Omaha's last tally came in the ninth. Genies drew a pretty single and came on to Thomas' two-bagger. Today the Kansas City team will play a postponed game with the Hourketties and the ladies' day sign will be nailed to the safe.

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MINING IN THE BLACK HILLS. Golden Reward Smelter Will Start Up Again in a Few Weeks. EMPLOYS FIVE HUNDRED MEN. Was Shut Down in March Because of a Strike and Repairs Have Been Made at the Plant While It Has Been Idle.

DEADWOOD, S. D., July 12.—(Special)—Last March some of the workmen in the Golden Reward smelter of this city struck because of their number had been discharged and were supported by the other men employed at the plant. The management of the smelter insisted that the strike was unjust and that the men were not acting fairly, so the big plant was closed down, throwing nearly 500 men at the plant out of employment and almost as many more at the mines of the country.

Eleventh Hour Prosper. The Eleventh Hour, in the same neighborhood with Victoria, over on Iron creek, is working a force of twenty-one miners. This company a month or so ago shipped a large quantity of ore from its mines to a Deadwood treatment plant, making a long haul, and the shipments, which were made more as a test of the ore than to gain profit from them, proved to be very satisfactory, paying expenses of mining and transportation besides leaving a handsome profit. Several large shoots of ore have been opened up on the company's ground, and its prospects look as good as those of any company working in the district.

Rev. Thrall Becomes a Doctor. HURON, S. D., July 12.—(Special)—Rev. W. H. Thrall of this city has been officially notified of his election to the degree of doctor of divinity by Redfield college. This is the first degree of the kind conferred by this institution. Mr. Thrall has been for many years a resident of South Dakota and was among the earliest preachers in this locality. For twelve years or more he has been superintendent of Congregational missions in the state.
