

Golden Reward Smelter Will Start Up Again in a Few Weeks.

Was Shut Down in March Because of Strike and Repairs Have Been Made at the Plant While it Has Been Idle.

DEADWOOD, S. D., July 12.-(Special.)-Last March some of the workmen in the Golden Reward smelter of this city struck because one of their number had been discharged and were supported by the other men employed at the plant. The management of the smolter considered that the strike was unjust and that the men were not acting fairly, so the big plant was closed down, throwing nearly 500 men at the plant out of employment and almost as many more at the mines of the company. idle, the Golden Reward company shipping from 300 to 400 tons of ore daily to smelting rmelter, which is the largest of its kind in the world, was a severe blow to Deadwood, which has keenly felt the loss of the wages of the 500 men who had formerly found employment at the plant. In a few weeks th smelter will again be in operation, and this money will be again paid out to workmen who make their homes in Deadwood. Harris Franklin, manager of the Golden Reward company and one of its principal stockholders, in conversation with The Bee correspondent yesterday, stated that the smelter will again be blown in. The company, he said, was waiting for the water to drain out of some of the workings before starting up the big plant, and when this had been done the smelter would be blown in for a continuous run, as the company would then have sufficient ore to work on and its prospects look as good as those of to keep it going constantly.
