BOARD BUYS COAL

Enters Into Contract with Sheridan Coal Company for Winter's Supply.

WILL TAKE ABOUT TWO THOUSAND TONS

The school board, at a special session yesterday, settled the question of fuel for the schools for the coming year by entering into a contract with the Sheridan Coal company for the immediate delivery of coal at all of the action becomes at a rate considerably lower than was offered at the time bids were submitted.

According to the centract, which was ordered to be drawn, the coal will be 1000 tons. The board is to pay \$4 per ton little wearers. They allow perfect freedom similar cost delivered outside of that limit the design is appropriate for cloth serge the price will be \$4.95 and \$4.60 contains of the limit. The contract provides for payment in spot cash at the time the coal is delivered and the contractor is instructed to make delivery as rapidly as he desires until the bins at all of the houses are filled. A clause in the contract holds the contractor free from loss on account of any strike which may delay the delivery of

the fuel While the contract is with the Sheridan Coal company, it is for coal handled in Omaha by the C. B. Havens Coal company only and Mr. Nash of the latter company was present and approved the form of contract prepared. It was said by one of the coal men present that the prices made were the result of an informal understanding between the different companies of the city and were the lowest that could be made on this grade of fuel.

The lowest price offered for the delivery of Cherokee not coal at the opening of the hids was \$1.75, which would indicate that by rejecting all bids the board has saved to the city about \$1.500 on its fuel supply for the coming winter.


