A few early buyers of fall goods are beginning to arrive on the market and it looks as though the majority of merchants will buy their fall stocks earlier this year than usual. Mail orders are also as liberal as could be expected at this between-season period.

The outlook for fall business seems to improve each week as the reports regarding the condition of the corn crop are much more favorable than they were a shirt time ago. The general impression niw seems to be that with normal weather fron this time on there will be a much better yield than was expected surfier in the season. With fair crops, jobbers say they will do a big fall business. Their advance orders are far ahead of all previous records and the fact that there have been practically no cancellations would indicate that retailers are not at all uneasy regarding future business. Sugar Market Active and Firm.

The sugar market is in much the same position it was a week ago, so far as refined grades are concerned Raws, however, are quoted a little firmer. California refineries have withdrawn from the market entirely, owing to oversales, and New York refineries are only taking orders subject to delay in shipment. They report the withdrawals from the market very heavy and the outlook is considered favorable for a strong market.

The cheme market is also a little higher, prices having been advanced on all grades of both Wisconsin and New York stock. In the line of canned goods additional interest has developed in future corn. This is owing to the serious damage done to the crop belonging to the Atlantic Canning company of Atlantic, ia. It is reported that considerably over half of their crop was destroyed last week by the tornade and hallstorm which visited that section of the country, and the company has so notified their buyers. Those affected by this shortage say that they fear it will be hard to find as much corn as had been contracted from the Atlantic company, as scarcely any canners have corn to offer at any price.

The canned tomato market is practically unchanged. Goods are going into consumption rapidly and it is thought that a large part of the carryover will have been absorbed before the new pack is available.

The market on gallon apples advanced sharply last week and is now quoted log life per dozen higher outside of New York state than it was a week ago. The demand for apples is reported very heavy and in fact canned goods in general have been selling very freely this year, much more so than usual. The increase is especially noticeable in the line of canned fruit.

There is also an active dried fruit market. Prices, though, are practically unchanged in the near future will be in the direction of higher prices.

In the line of woodenware there have been several advances in the different lines and the market is still in a very strong position. Imported sardines are said to be scarce, owing to the short catch last season. Reports received from reliable sources show that so are this year no better results have been obtained. Higher prices on the entire line are predicted.

In regard to the condition of trade, wholesale grocers say that while business is not quite as rushing as it was a week or ten days ago there is nevertheless a good brisk trade for this season of the year, with prospects for the future very encouraging.

Cotton Goods Continue Firm.

Cotton Goods Continue Firm. The cotton goods market continues in the same strong position it has been in for some time past, with the tendency of prices upward rather than downward. Those best upward rather than downward. Those best posted say that while goods may look high they are not as high as they would be if they were based on the present price of cotton. The only thing that has prevented a much more radical advance is the fact that most manufacturers had cotton on hand that was bought at a lower fagure, and as fast as that supply gives out most manufacturers are closing down, refusing to pay the high prices. This, of course, is causing a marked shortage in production, so Jobbers look for higher prices before there are any reductions. They also fear there will be little relief even when the new crop of cotton arrives on the market. That being the case cotton goods at present prices appear to be good property.

Locally the dry goods trade is very satisfactory. Traveling men are ricking up a good many orders and mail orders are fully as liberal as could be expected. A few merchants are beginning to strive on the market to place their fall orders, but the rush of fall buyers has not begun as yet, although in a short time it is expected that house trade will assume large proportions. Jobbers are devoting most of their attention to filling their advance orders, and this will keep them busy for some time to come.

The leather goods trade is also in good hape so far as the wholesaler is con-erned. A few sizing up orders are coming a, but it is fall business that jobbers are ow looking at. Their traveling salesmen and the state of orders from
