LINCOLN, July S.-(Special.)-A comparison of the figures returned by the various assessors over the state shows that Douglas county comes pretty near being all of the state when it comes to assessed valuations. Douglas county assessors returned 196,425 acres of land valued at \$3,-188,290 and 68,803 lots valued at \$14,768,406, or a total valuation of lands and lots of

The entire state, including Douglas county, returned \$3,408,776 acres of land and 496,819 lots. The lots are valued by the seors at \$33,129,969 and the land at \$88,-145,215, or a total valuation of \$121,275,184. Douglas county's assessment taken from this leaves only \$105.315.498 for the state.

The attention of the State Board of Equalization has been called to the high valuation of Douglas county property as compared with the remainder of the state and the board has the matter under careful consideration. In all probability Douglas county will be treated well by the board in recognition of the good work of its as-

Instruction to Oil Inspectors.

Because sensational newspapers of late have been severely criticising his action in regard to orders to deputy oil inspectors, Governor Mickey today gave out the following signed statement as a copy of the orders issued to each of the deputy oil inspectors:

inspectors:

Do not sccept for official inspection any samples of oil which you yourself (or someone deputised to act for you) have not taken from the source of supply, that is, from the car tank, from the storage tank or from the barrel or receptacle in which shipment was made. The inspection of oil which irresponsible parties may hand to you in bottles, and which is alleged to be a sample from some tank or barrel, but which you know nothing about personally, is absolutely prohibited. The inspection of oil must be made to mean all that the law contemplates in the matter of safety to consumers. You must not only know that the oil you inspect and pass is fully up to the standard, but you must also know that the sample inspected has been taken from the supply tank. This rule must be rigidly adhered to.
