Hooley Fails in New York and William Barrett Goes Under in Bosten While Rumor Spenks of . Other Assignments.

NEW YORK, July 27 .- In spite of or probably because of the two additional failures on the Stock exchange-E. S. Hooley & Co. of this city and William Barrett of Bostontoday's stock market showed general improvement and the situation as a whole was viewed with more cheerfulness.

The Hooley fulture was regarded as an inevitable sequel to that of W. L. Stow & Co., which came last Friday. The failure of Mr. Barrett was wholly unimportant. The market displayed a hesitating tone at the outset, many of the railroad stocks showing fractional declines. Slight improvement soon followed, prices went off 1 to 5 points, with even greater declines in the specialties, as soon as the failure came out. Evansville & Terre Haute, a Hooley specialty, declined Big points and the entire

list reflected considerable confusion. By the end of the first hour the situation seemed well in hand and the prices advanced, save in a few instances where pressure continued to be directed upon certain

I believe over-capifulization and the dis-astrous collapse of three or four recently organized trusts have paralyzed the buyer, produced a general fright and terrible liquidation of good securities to protect holders. Despite this liquidation, which has reduced the average values of securi-ties IS per cent, bank loans have not been reduced, nor has the surplus reserve been materially increased.

Fully 100,000 Russians Emptied in Province Before Evacuation Date.

WHEAT EXPORT TO JAPAN IS STOPPED

Ignored Chinese Law Put in Force When Mikado Makes Vigorous Preparations for Possible War.

PEKING, July II .- The Russian administration of New Chwang has stopped the export of wheat to Japan. The export of grain from Chinese ports is illegal, but the Russians heretofore have ignored the law. During the past week Japan obtained maintenance of the peace of all nations many shiploads from New Chwang, apparently preparing for war contingencies. Several ships were employed in bringing wheat from Shanghal and southern ports where the king unveiled a statue erected to New Chwang, where it was transshipped as a direct export. The prohibitory order was issued by the Russian officials on Thursday.

General Kondrodravitch has been placed in charge of six armed commercial boats and the navigation of the Liao river, which is construed here as another sign of Russia's intention to refain New Chwang and the charge of the river.

A number of the Russian civilians and officers' families are being brought to Manchuris, it is believed, in pursuance of a omprehensive plan to rapidly colonize the rovince. At the present rate there will be almost 100,000 Russian civillans in Manchuria, Including Port Arthur and Dainy, before the date fixed for the final evacuation next fall.
