COSSIP OF COMMISSION ROW

Grocers Object to Publication of Wholesale

Prices of Fruits and Vegetables.

DECLARE IT IS NOT LEGITIMATE NEWS Commission Men Take Opposite View,

Declaring Reports Make Trade, but May Accede to Resuers of Reinilers' Association,

Action will not improbably be taken at the Tuesday meeting of the Retail Grocers' essociation leading to the suppression of the publishing of wholesale market prices on fruits and vegetables. A number of grocers object strongly to these market reports and will bring the matter up. The objection is in particular to the market and commission house reports which have appeared on the front page of The Bee during the season, and which have been taken up by other papers.

"We object very much to this publication of wholesale prices," said a leading grocer, who refused to allow his name to be used, "and we will take the matter up at our next meeting. If the papers continue with these reports we will take some action in the matter. They are an injury to the retail grocer, and I think that when the papers find this out they will not continue to do what we do not wish. In the first place there are a large number of people who are our patrons who read these articles and who do not understand that the prices quoted are wholesale and not retail. They come to us and want this or that thing which has been mentioned in the latest paper, and when we charge them the retail price they complain, saying the papers give the prices much lower, and go away without buying. I have read The Bee's reports, and I will say that I have found them correct. We do not complain in that direction, but we do not want the wholesale prices published. When we charge our profit for handling, which is small enough, people try to force our prices down to the wholesale. Then, with berries and other perishable things, the price depends so much on the condition, and the condition changes so rapidly. We do not consider the publication of wholesale prices and of the arrival of consignments of various vegetables and fruits as legitimate news; it hurts the retail grocer and we want it stopped."

Other Retailers Concur.

Other grocers concur in this view to a nore or less extent, although some of them say their only objection lies in the fact that many customers do not understand that only wholesale prices are meant. It seems, however, to be the general opinion among grocers that it is unfair to them to publish their profit on these lines of perish-

able goods. Wholesale dealers have been reluctant to give quotations during the last few days, especially on berries and similar perishable articles, and say that they have received numerous complaints from their customers. It is not improbable that the association will request the dealers not to give out prices. The retailers are well organized and are powerful enough to dictate to the commission men. The wholesalers regard that the demand for new fruits and vegetables is made lively. In several instances they have received letters from out-of-town dealers asking shipments of new fruits.
