British Tennis Champions Defeat Larned and E. D. Wrenn in Singles.

SCORE FOUR TO ONE FOR BRITONS

American Defenders Only Secure One Point, that Boing Given in Default When Elder Visitor

Sprains Shoulder.

BOSTON, Aug. 8.-The international tennis trophy, presented three years ago by Dwight H. Davis of this country, goes to England through the united efforts of R. F. and H. L. Doherty, who clinched their victory by winning both matches in singles today and scoring in the entire contest four out of a total of five points. Each of the two contests today went a full five sets. H. I. Doherty, the English champion, defeating William A. Larned, the American champion, 6-3, 6-8, 6-0, 2-6, 7-5, while his brother disposed of R. D. Wrenn, former American champion, 6-4, 3-6, 6-3, 6-8, 6-4.

Big Crowd Excited.

The matches were played on adjoining courts, and were witnessed by 5,000 tennis enthusiasts. From the start the excitement was intense and after each match had been squared at the end of four sets, everyone was fairly on tip toe until H. L. Doherty won a long deuce set, his match,

court undoubtedly won him the match with Larned, although to the minds of many an unfortunate decision at a critical stage in the last set was the cause of the latter's failure. Larned seemed wild and his errors were frequent, while Doherty played carefully, although he relied almost entirely on his opponent's mistakes,
