FORMER OMAHA MAN KILLED

E. D. Lord, Well Known Traveling Salesman, Meets Accidental Death in Texas.

STRUCK BY PIECE OF EXPLODED BOILER

Although Some Distance from the Engine He is Almost Instantly Killed While Eating Dinner.

E. D. Lord, who traveled for May Bros. of Fremont for a number of years and later for McCord-Brady & Co. and other Omaha firms, was almost instantly killed at Beaumont, Tex. The boiler of the Black Hawk Oil company's plant on Spindie Top exploded and flying fragments high into the air, one of the pieces of the boiler shooting through the air for 100 yards and smashing through the house where Mr. Lord was eating dinner. It struck him on the side of the head and tore a large gash which resulted in almost instant death.

A negro woman, who had called for laundry at the time, was also struck and badly injured at the same time. Mr. Lord was about 45 years old and was well known in Omaha and throughout Nebraska, where he had made a good record as a traveling salesman. In 1888 his poor health necessitated his removal to the south, and he eventually located in the oil fields, where he had been quite successful in the land and oil business. He was unmarried. Three sisters survive him, Mrs. Carpenter of Grand Island, and Miss Ida Lord and Stella Bartlett of 129 East Twenty-fifth street, Chicago. The remains were shipped to his birthplace, Dunkirk, N. Y., for interment.

Mr. Lord's death occurred August 2.
