After calling at one or two places on the coast of Lower California, they proceeded to the islands of San Bernardino and Socorro situated about 250 miles off the Mexican coast. On Socorro, which contains to square miles no mammals were found, but complete and rare ornithological specimens were secured. At Clarion, another island, 250 miles further out at sea, three specimens of land birds were secured and seven specimens also at Socorro.

One rare water bird was found on the Reveilagelio group. A red-billed cropic bird was secured off San Diego, the farthert north this wpecies has been found. All told about 1,000 specimens of birds were secured. together with valuable botanical specimens, while twenty gallons of alcohol were filled with snakes and lizards.

A peculiarity of the islands is that while in parts vegetation flourishes, nowhere is water found upon any of them. An active volcano 4,000 feet high was found on So corro. Wild sheep abound on this island and Guadaloupe is literally overrun with
