

COLONEL OF TWENTY-SECOND

Henry Wygant, Late of the Sixth, to Command at Fort Crook.

MANY OFFICERS OF THE LINE MOVE UP

Records of the Men Who Are Given Regiments Under Recent Orders and Others Who Step Up Accordingly.

Colonel Henry Wygant, the new commanding officer of the Twenty-second Infantry, U. S. A., comes to that command with an excellent record as a soldier, covering a period of campaigning against the Indians from 1875 to 1891, and during the Spanish-American and Philippine wars.

Captain John S. Parks, Jr., formerly of the Twenty-first infantry, becomes a major of the Twenty-second infantry. He was appointed to the West Point Military Academy from Arkansas in 1882, and graduated high in the class, and was appointed second lieutenant in the Twenty-fourth infantry June 24, 1882.

Some New Colonels. Lieutenant Colonel John B. Hoffman of the Twentieth infantry, who becomes colonel of the Twenty-fifth infantry, was appointed to the West Point Military Academy from Massachusetts, September 1, 1881.

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Major Daniel H. Bush of the Twenty-fifth infantry becomes lieutenant colonel of the Eleventh infantry. He is presently acting chief instructor of the Department of the Missouri, and is likely to be retained in that position.

Captain Charles W. Abbott, Jr., of the Twelfth infantry becomes major of the Twenty-fifth infantry. He was appointed a second lieutenant in the Twelfth infantry March 18, 1884. He graduated from the Infantry and Cavalry school in 1887.

Captain John H. Beason, who became major of the Sixth infantry, was appointed a second lieutenant in the Twelfth infantry March 18, 1884. He graduated from the Infantry and Cavalry school in 1887.

Major Robert H. R. Loughborough of the Sixth infantry is promoted lieutenant colonel of the same regiment. He entered the army from civil life from Virginia, having been appointed a second lieutenant in the Twelfth infantry in 1887, captain in 1891 and major in 1895.

Another Hospital Benefit. Tickets are being sold for a picnic to be held at Krug park September 1 by the women of the South Omaha hospital association.

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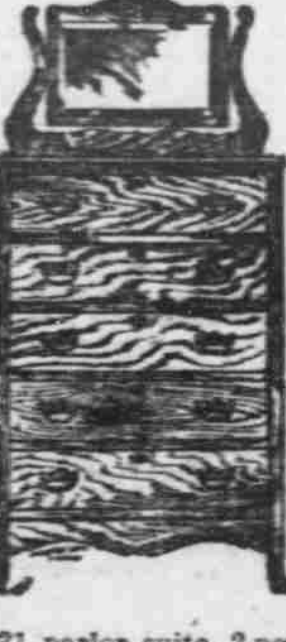
