Frank Martin's Fatal Injury by Falling from Burlington Train

MAN DYING IN HOSPITAL FROM INJURIES

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COMMERCIAL AND FINANCIAL

Favorable Crop Weather Affects the Grain Markets.

WHEAT AND CORN A FRACTION LOWER.

Trading is dull, with prices unsettled—Provisions Firm and Unchanged to a Slight Higher.

CHICAGO, Aug. 22.—Dullness pervaded the grain and flour markets and continued favorable weather wheat raised week, September closing 1/4c lower. September corn was off 1/4c, closing 24 1/2c, but provisions were unchanged to be higher.

Trading in wheat was of a very tame character. The opening was easier under the influence of excellent weather in the northwest.

There was a fair demand for the first week of September, but the market turned quite firm, September advancing to 8 1/2c, but the general trend of corn was of a weakish nature and free liquidation soon caused a decline.

Liberal clearances and receipts of new wheat at Minneapolis were depressing influences in the latter part of the session. The close was near the bottom price of the day, September being 1/4c lower at 75 1/2c, after selling 1/4c, but the market was 1/4c higher.

Trade was chiefly affected by the liberal selling on the part of a prominent interest. The market was 1/4c higher, with the price of December and May were sold out by the bull leaders, and with a rather limited demand for the crop, September being 1/4c lower.

The weather continued favorable for threshing and movement. September 24th of the crop is considerable after ranging between 25 1/2c and 26 1/2c. Local receipts were 1,000 cars.

Provisions rule firm early in the day on a smaller run of hogs and better prices at the market. The market was 1/4c higher for long for October lamb and ribs, together with covering by shorts. A firm under the cover of the market was 1/4c higher.

Estimated total for Monday: Wheat, 10,000 cars; corn, 25,000 cars; hogs, 25,000 head.

The leading futures ranged as follows: Wheat: Sept. 80 1/2, Oct. 79 1/2, Nov. 78 1/2, Dec. 77 1/2.

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
