

SIGSBEE SAVED THE MAINE

Incident in the Career of the New Admira Before the Havana Disaster.

HARD SAILING IN NEW YORK HARBOR

Rammed a Pier to Save an Excursion Steamer-Collision With a Bridge Pier Narrowly Averted.

Newspaper men who were at Havana in tain, now Rear Admiral, Sigsbee labored. Is it to be marveled at? He had hundreds could not know how fully his government and fellow citizens exonerated him from all Chicago & Northwestern, Nebraska biame. His heart, if not his duty, called him often to the hospital where his maimed seamen fought for their lives. He had hourly telegrams from Washington to an-speech, look, or gesture, give indication of the storm of wrath within him when he "remembered the Maine." Signbee knew his battleship had been blown up from the outside; that the good craft whose engines, as the late Chief Engineer Howell told me, 'never once stopped when it left a port until it reached its succeeding harbor," was sunk by treacherous, dastardly hands. Dissimuation was gall to the frank sailor.

Days of Trink.

Brave to meet the trinis of long days as he was to meet the sudden imminence of danger, Sigsbee bore up marvelously. He was cheerful, ready, prompt, effective. But the strain showed in the deepening lines of his kindly face, the quick start at a sudden sound, the worn look in his weary eyes. Saturday morning, February 19, the fourth day after the disaster, Consul General Fitzhugh Lee personally asked the principal orrespondents not only to refrain from questioning the captain about Maine, but, if possible, to lead him to talk of other things. 'Help him to lose for a moment or more the mental picture of that ghastly wreck,"

said Lee, and we all cheerfully agreed. About II o'clock that Saturday night my work of running fake and real stories to earth, jollying the censor, and urging speed on the cable operators having ended, was tending bedward in the Hotel Inglaterra, when Captain Sigabee came in. After a word or two of greeting he said:

"Let's go into the cafe and get some cold nilk or something (the mercury was in the eighties). My room is opposite the Tacon theater, and as they are having their nightly ball, of course I can't sleep. How in the world they can call that long-drawn rumpet shrick music surpasses my ken." Mindful of General Lee's request I bethought me of a very gallant thing Sigsbee did in 1897, and recalled it to his memory. One morning Signbee had brought the Maine through Hell Gate and was steering down the East river to a berth in the Brooklyn navy yard, when an excursion boat, loaded with women and children, got directly in front of him, and the master losing his grip, rang confusing bells until a panic was imminent. The Maine could

not turn to port, for a couple of big barges loaded with freight cars were in the way.

Two Thrilling Incidents. "I simply could not run down circumstances. "I knew it was dangerous to run a battleship into a dock, but I had no other choice. When the big ship crashed into the pier near Thirty-fourth street I said to myself, 'Sigabee, there goes your commission,' and when, instead of blaming, the newspapers praised my action in unmeasured terms, and the Navy department

wrote me in laudation, I felt pleased, I can "Funny, though," continued the captain, with a smile. "I never was praised for what I did a few moments later, and it was a fairly good job, too. When Maine backed clear of the pier and we discovered the ship's hurts were superficial and slight we straightened out for the navy yard. But it is no joke to handle a 6,000-ton manof-war, drawing twenty-five feet or so, in a crowded river, with the tide running strong and all sorts of eddies to contend with. In spite of all precautions we swung under the Brooklyn bridge before we got turned for the yard. Then a vicious eddy struck us and carried the ship closer and closer to the Brooklyn pier. To hit that meant destruction. I was on the bridge
