CRESCEUS BREAKS A RECORD

Lowers that for Half-Mile Track at Exhibition at Dayton.

TAKES HALF SECOND FROM BEST TIME

Owner Uses Steam Automobile at a Pacemaker in His Record Brenking Race Against

DAYTON, O., Aug. 27.-A new world's trotting record of 2:08% for a half-mile track was made by George H. Ketchum's Cresceus this afternoon. Ketchum drove him and had it not been for a close-hitch bike sulky the record would have been 2:07. This caused the great horse almost to break in the first half in the back stretch and again in the last eighth of the

Cresceus was paced by Mike the Tramp, driven by Dr. A. Scott of Montreal, and by a steam automobile driven by Mr. Denser. This was an experiment and its utility remains to be demonstrated. The previous record for a trotted mile on a half-mile track was 2:00% and was made by Cresceus at Kansas City two years ago, READVILLE, Mass., Aug. 27.-About 2,000 persons attended the Grand Circuit races today. The conditions were not perfect for extremely fast time. The track had dried out but slightly, while the clouds kent the sunshine away.


