

PREPARING FOR MANY SUITS

Owners of Collapsed Douglas Street Buildings Going to Courts for Relief.

GROCER HUGHES WILL ALSO ASK DAMAGES

Inspector Withnell Will Not Condemn Adjoining Buildings—Prospect for New Block on Site Cleared by Leases.

A fence has been built out into Douglas street surrounding the ruins of the collapsed buildings No. 1403 and No. 1405, but it is stated that the old brick and other refuse will be moved before Christmas.

H. J. Hughes has retained Hall & McCulloch and will bring a damage suit against the Western Real Estate trustees of Boston, owners of the building 1403 Douglas, for the value of his stock and fixtures and other damage sustained by him.

A. J. Hanson, it is stated, will also bring suit against the same parties for the value of the building, No. 1403 Douglas, and the loss sustained through its falling down.

Representatives of the Western Real Estate Trustees are also preparing to bring suit against A. J. Hanson. Whether or not H. J. Hughes will be included in this suit has not yet been determined.

The main allegation in the first set of suits will be that the destruction of the building, No. 1403 Douglas, and the stock and fixtures in it was caused by the alterations in progress to the building No. 1405 Douglas.

The main allegation in the other set of suits will be that the falling of the two buildings was caused by the disintegration and undermining of the party wall between them, such disintegration and undermining being caused by water which dripped onto and through it from an ice box in the grocery store in 1405 Douglas.

Several old-timers who remember when the upper stories were put on the buildings twenty years ago say that plenty of testimony can be obtained by both sides to the effect that the buildings have been constructed unwise for years, and that when the upper stories were placed on them many remarked that the walls were not strong enough to bear the added weight.

Building Inspector Withnell has not yet officially done any condemning, and states that the two-story brick on the corner, occupied by a pawnshop, tobacco and news store, with lodging rooms above, is not seriously injured, and will be allowed to stand.

Willing to Build. Frank B. Kennard, owner of the corner building, states that he would strenuously contest any condemning of the building by the city, but that he is perfectly willing to tear it down and join the owners of the lots to the west in putting up a substantial block, with store rooms below and office rooms on the upper floors.

The Kennard lot is 106 feet 9 inches on Fourteenth and 25 feet on Douglas. The Hanson, Western Real Estate Trustees and Horbach lots to the west are each 22 feet on Douglas and run back 125 feet to the alley. Mr. Kennard will suggest to the other owners the erection of a three-story building, of substantial construction, handsome in appearance and strictly modern.

J. J. Sullivan, agent for the building No. 1407 Douglas, states that he has the assurance of Building Inspector Withnell that it will not be condemned, and that as soon as the overhanging wall is removed it can be occupied. The owners of the building, who have a long time lease on the ground, will very willingly, he says, sell out at a low figure to anyone desiring to build, but are not disposed to do any building on the lot.
